

## 2023 ANNUAL REPORT

Taking action to create communities free of family violence.



Synergy serves children, youth, adults and families who may have experienced any of the following: mental health crisis, emergency shelter needs, domestic violence, child abuse, sexual assault, homelessness, teen parenting or bullying, and a range of general mental health related issues.

## 25,945 clients served



**57,187** nights of safety were provided to children, youth, individuals and families in our residential program.



**16,548** students received prevention education through our School Based Integrated Services.



**70,508** hours of service provided to our Kansas City community through our programming.

## noticeable trends

- Increase in depression, anxiety, and isolation, particularly post COVID.
- Increase in crisis calls, particularly for those seeking mental health therapy.
- Rates of suicide attempts among young people remain high and are increasing.
- Increased need for Domestic Violence Intervention Program (DVIP) services.
  - Increased need for school based integrated services prevention, therapy, and behavioral support interventions.
- Increased need for affordable housing for homeless youth and domestic violence survivors.

## organizational news

Like other non-profit agencies across Kansas City, Synergy had to balance the growing needs in homelessness, mental health, and family violence with the lingering challenges of staff shortages in this post-pandemic period. The severity of these conditions decreased in the last quarter of 2023; however, training and staff development will remain a primary focus in 2024.

In response to these needs, Synergy initiated key major projects in 2023.

- Capital Campaign and New Domestic Violence
  Housing Campus: Synergy started its capital campaign
  in 2022, and with the joint efforts of our Board of
  Directors and Executive Leadership teams, made major
  progress towards covering all expenses related to the
  project and creating a reserve fund. As of December
  2023, our teams had secured eleven million dollars
  and a 12-acre parcel of land, close to Synergy's other
  campuses. When completed, the campus will have
  18 apartments (seven 2-bdrm, five 3-bdrm, and six
  4-bdrm) to house survivor families as they become
  more stable and move toward a safer future. The project
  should be completed in June 2025.
- New Domestic Violence Court: Synergy has become known across Missouri and the region for their excellence in treating domestic violence offenders. This success has led to numerous efforts in the community to create a separate court docket for cases that must focus on the complexity of these cases and to have Synergy's referral sources ready.
- Expanded Access to Emergency Housing: Synergy
  engaged in an extensive collaborative effort to
  explore the feasibility of a youth housing project in
  Jackson County. Additionally, the agency made a
  major commitment to add six new vehicles to its fleet
  to accommodate client transportation needs. The
  expansion of services in the Street Outreach program
  and at the Youth Resiliency Center is one more
  indicator of Synergy's efforts to respond to growing
  community need.
- Continued Success for our School Based Integrated Services: Synergy's School Based Integration Services (SBIS) program remained active in many school districts in Clay, Jackson, and Platte County. The increase in resiliency services (classroom prevention education) is remarkable and demonstrates the thirst for prevention and early intervention services for students. North Kansas City School District increased its partnership with Synergy by initiating a program at YRC for students in out-of-school suspension to incentivize earlier return to the classroom. Behavioral support programs within the schools continue to expand and grow from district to district.
- Youth Resiliency Center Hosted the North Kansas City CAPS Program: Synergy hosted a program for students from the North Kansas City School District who have been suspended for 10+ days to be able to come and work on homework with a teacher and engage in YRC youth activities. Students successfully engaged make good use of academic, social and emotional support and return to the classroom with more skills for success.
- New Website: This is a significant update in technology is an opportunity to serve clients, stakeholders, donors, and other mental health providers in a more effective and efficient manner. The website is scheduled to launch March 2024.



# Carrie's story

Carrie\*, a 40-year-old mother, and her daughter, an 8-year-old who has Down Syndrome, came to our Domestic Violence Housing Program (DVHP) after leaving an abusive partner. Carrie had an extensive history of childhood and intimate partner abuse, and was diagnosed with several ongoing illnesses. During her time in the DVHP, our team helped the family secure Social Security Disability benefits and case management services, two critical components of maintaining a positive relationship with her daughter's school and medical services. Carrie regularly attended individual therapy and group therapy, and began eating disorder treatment.

During her time at the DVHP, she overcame a multitude of mental health and medical barriers for both herself and her daughter and was able to take over her lease upon her graduation from the program. Carrie is enrolled in Aftercare services and continues to attend therapy through Family Care. She reports that she continues to maintain her and her daughter's mental health and medical treatment plans successfully.

In the time that he has been enrolled in SOS, he has reconnected with family and moved back into his family home. He has shown a true desire to grow and put the work in so that he can live independently. Jacob's Case Manager has no doubt that he will continue to grow and impress us with his determination!

   who are in crisis due to abuse, family dysfunction, abandonment, homelessness or parental emergencies.
- Domestic Violence: Center 816-321-7050 Emergency shelter and support services for adult domestic violence survivors and their children.

   18 months of stable housing, counseling, case management and support to enable youth and young families to transition from homelessness to self-sufficiency.

   Safe, stable housing and support services to enable domestic violence survivors and their children to escape abuse without becoming homeless.

#### Medical, Dental & Vision Care: 816-505-4865

Our on-site clinic is consciously designed and operated to overcome the barriers that prevent homeless and at-risk children and youth from accessing regular healthcare. A variety of services are provided utilizing collaborations between healthcare providers.

Mental Health & Counseling Services: 816-587-4100 A wide-range of counseling services to strengthen individuals and families and help them function in a healthy way including: Individual, Couple, Family & Group Counseling; Art, Movement, Music & Play Therapy; Other Behavioral Therapies.

School Based Integrated Services: 816-321-7470
Trauma informed services delivered in schools to help students overcome trauma and develop the social and emotional skills necessary to be a successful learner and reach their full potential.

Children's Advocacy Center: 816-321-7040

A multidisciplinary team approach to preventing, investigating, prosecuting and providing healing services for child abuse victims. A collaboration between law enforcement, Children's Division and other child serving agencies to conduct forensic interviews and offer advocacy support to children and families who are navigating the child welfare system.

Education, case management and mentoring for pregnant and parenting teens up to their 22nd birthday.

A unique place to promote growth and healing for at-risk youth through: a clinic providing medical, mental, dental and vision services; support groups; computer lab and education center; creative arts center and recording studio; indoor basketball court and teaching kitchen; and a drop-in center for homeless youth to eat, take a shower and do laundry.




